



# 2022 Phi Beta Mu Mississippi Band Director of the Year

Dr. Craig Aarhus

Dr. Craig Aarhus is Associate Director of Bands and Associate Professor of Music at Mississippi State University. At MSU, he co-directs the Famous

Maroon Band and basketball pep bands, conducts Wind Ensemble "B," the Concert Band, and Campus Band, and teaches Conducting and Brass Techniques in the Department of Music. He also currently serves as the area coordinator for Music Education in the department. As a member of the band faculty, Dr. Aarhus has been part of a team that has helped lead the band program to unprecedented growth, making it currently one of the largest bands in the Southeast.

A native of Alabama, Dr. Aarhus received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from Auburn University and his Master of Arts and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees in Conducting from The University of Iowa. While at Iowa, he was the recipient of the prestigious Iowa Performance Fellowship and was a conducting student of Dr. Myron Welch. He also served as a graduate conductor for all the concert bands, arranged music and wrote drill for the Hawkeye Marching Band, and was co-director of the Iowa Pep Band. During this time, he was also the director of the Southeast Iowa Concert Band at Iowa Wesleyan College for one year. Prior to his appointment at MSU, Dr. Aarhus was a successful high school and middle band director in the public schools of Lanett, Tallassee, and Mobile, Alabama.

Dr. Aarhus is a member of several professional organizations including Phi Beta Mu (Past-President, Delta Chapter), the College Band Directors National Association, Phi Mu Alpha, Tau Beta Sigma and the Mississippi Bandmasters Association. He is currently serving on the Board of Directors of the National Band Association and recently completed a ten-year tenure as a Governor for the Southeast District of Kappa Kappa Psi. Dr. Aarhus has been an adjudicator and clinician throughout the Southeast, Midwest, and in Canada, and is a contributing author to five volumes of the popular *Teaching Music Through Performance in Band* series. He has presented at numerous state and national conferences, including The Midwest Clinic, the CBDNA Summer Athletic Band Symposium, and the Mississippi Bandmasters Association State Band Clinic.

The Delta Chapter of Phi Beta Mu selected Dr. Aarhus as the 2022 "Outstanding Bandmaster" in Mississippi, and in 2019, the Southeast District of Kappa Kappa Psi named their "Outstanding Director/Sponsor" Award after him. Other recent honors and awards include the A. Frank Martin Award from Kappa Kappa Psi for excellence in fraternity service (2017), the Clyde Muse Service Award from the MSU College of Education (2015) and selection to the George Duke Humphrey Faculty Leadership Program (2015). In 2010 and 2011, he was a recipient of the "StatePride" Award for excellence in teaching, research, and service. He has been a clinician/instructor at the Smith-Walbridge Drum Major Clinics for over 20 years, and in that capacity has had the opportunity to teach hundreds of high school and college drum majors from across the country. Dr. Aarhus and his family reside in Starkville and are members of First Presbyterian Church, where he has served as Music Director since 2007.



#### 2023 Phi Beta Mu Outstanding Contributor

## David & Sue Nicholson

David Nicholson, after graduating from Mississippi State University, guided the Carthage, MS band program to its first-ever All-Superior ratings. Nicholson then served the Pearl (MS) School District where All-Superior ratings were earned in concert, marching, sight-reading, and jazz throughout his tenure as director of bands, including a performance at the USM Conductors' Conference, and an MBA (now Bands of America) Over-all Grand Championship title at the Southwest Regional in



Houston, TX. The Pearl Band also placed 2nd and 6th overall in the MBA/BOA Summer Nationals (Whitewater, Wisconsin) and Grand Nationals (Johnson City, TN) respectively.

David and his wife Sue together were named Outstanding Band Directors in Mississippi in 1982-83. The Nicholsons twice served as directors of the Miss. Lions All-State Band, winning the Lions International Championship in 1980 (Chicago), and in 1982 performing a field show in the Durban, South Africa Military Tattoo eight consecutive nights.

David is a member of Phi Beta Mu, Phi Mu Alpha, Florida Bandmasters Association, and has adjudicated band events in 20 states. After a career in fundraising, David most recently served as assistant band director, Madison-Central HS, Madison, MS and is currently an active member of USBands, Indiana State School Music Association, and Florida Bandmasters Association adjudication panels.

Sue Nicholson graduated from Mississippi State University with a Bachelor of Music Education degree. Mrs. Nicholson taught instrumental music for 13 years in Mississippi and 17 years in the Florida panhandle. While in Mississippi, Mrs. Nicholson helped lead the way for the Pearl High School Band to become nationally known through Marching Bands of America (now BOA) competitions, where they were consistent finalists at regional competitions, including finalists at MBA Summer Nationals and Grand Nationals. The Nicholson's together received the Phi Beta Mu Outstanding Bandmaster Award for Mississippi in 1983. Sue was twice on the staff of the Mississippi Lions All-State Band, including the band's 1982 tour of South Africa, where the Lions Band performed a field show eight straight evenings at the Durban Military Tattoo, as well as performances in Johannesburg and Pretoria.

While in Florida, Sue taught band in Okaloosa and Walton Counties, first at Max Bruner Middle School, the feeder program for the Fort Walton Beach High School Band. She also started the instrumental music program at the Seaside Neighborhood School, Seaside, FL (one of Florida's first Charter Schools) and taught there 7 years. While at Seaside, the school received the Enrollment Award at FMEA for having over 70% of the school's enrollment participating in band. The Seaside Band consistently earned Superior ratings at district FBA music performance evaluations.

Sue has judged marching bands and winter guards throughout the United States for 32 years, including marching band state championship finals in 10 states. She is a member of Phi Beta Mu, Florida Bandmasters Association, Gulf Coast Judges Association, the USBands Adjudication Team, is an FBA Adjudicator, an ISSMA adjudicator, was a Winter Guard International adjudicator for 28 years, and the 2016 inductee into the Gulf Coast Color Guard Circuit Hall of Fame. She is now in her 10th year as a representative for Fear Nothing Music Gear, while continuing to judge marching band and winter guard competitions nationally.

In 1990 the Delta chapter of Phi Beta Mu International Bandmasters Fraternity and the Mississippi Bandmasters Association formed a Hall of Fame to honor our most outstanding retired band directors. # 2023 Phi Beta Mu Hall of Fame



#### David Willson

David Willson, Professor of Music, and Director of University Bands at the University of Mississippi has inspired thousands. Over David's career, he has made it his mission to not only serve his students but also to teach them to live their lives in a way that matters, a philosophy that he has stood by through the many ups and downs of his life's journey.

David began his career as a public-school band director. His bands consistently received many prestigious awards at local and national competitions. He received the Southeastern Music Educator of the Year award in 1982, the ASBDA-Stanbury young band director of the year award in 1985, Mississippi's Outstanding Band Master award in 1989 and was on the cover of SBO magazine in August 2011.

His success continued at the University of Mississippi. Under David's direction, his students have joined in various competitions and performances and have been featured on radio and received numerous awards.

His most notable success is the Pride of the South Marching Band. Under his direction, the band has doubled in size and made the "Grove Routine" part of the Ole Miss tradition.

#### THE EDYTHE M. MCARTHUR WOMEN'S MUSIC EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD



From her humble beginnings as a full-time student and part time band director in Taylorsville in the late 1950's, through the magnificent Henderson (Starkville) Junior High Bands of the mid 1970's to her small but immaculately taught West Point Junior High Bands of the early 90's, (about which she often commented that this was where she did her best teaching), Edythe McArthur was the unquestioned pioneer for women music educators in Mississippi.

While she never considered herself a women-libber, Mrs. Mac paved the way for future generations of women in music education not simply by being one of the first women in what was at that time a male dominated profession, but by being the consummate professional, master teacher and a lady in the truest since of the word that she was.

#### 2022 EDYTHE MCARTHUR WOMEN'S MUSIC EDUCATOR OF THE YEAR



Ida Mitchell

Ida Mitchell is in her 40th year as a Mississippi music educator with the last 16 years serving as Director of Bands for Stone County Schools. She received her Bachelor of Music Education degree from Delta State University in 1984 under the leadership of Dr. Bill Clark.

Prior to her appointment with Stone County Schools, Ms. Mitchell spent 23 years teaching in the Mississippi Association of Independent Schools serving as Director of Bands at Adams County Christian School, Parklane Academy, and Hillcrest Christian School. While at Adams County Christian School the band performed in 1984 for then Vice-President George H. W. Bush and in 1986 Ms. Mitchell received the Natchez Coca Cola Teacher of the Year Award. Ms. Mitchell was honored to serve as the Assistant Concert Director for the 2000 Mississippi Lions All State Band. In 2004, the Hillcrest Symphonic Winds performed by invitation at Boston Symphony Hall as part of the Heritage Honors Program. Throughout her career, bands under Ms. Mitchell's leadership have earned numerous All-Superior Ratings in the areas of Marching, Concert, and Sight-Reading as well as being named Grand Champion in the MHSAA/MBA State Marching Championship in 2019 and 2021 and Silver Medalists in 2022 and 2023. The Stone Band Program has also earned multiple Sweepstakes Awards and is the 2022 recipient of the American School Band Directors Association Program of Excellence Award.

Ms. Mitchell has been recognized by receiving the 2018 USM Art Institute of Mississippi Award, the 2018 Phi Beta Mu Mississippi Band Director of the Year Award, the 2022 Gulf Coast Band Directors Association Band Director of the Year Award, and the 2022 Edythe M. McArthur Women's Music Educator of the Year Award. Her professional affiliations include the Mississippi Bandmasters Association (2nd Vice-President), National Band Association, American School Band Directors Association, Phi Beta Mu (President in 2021), and Gulf Coast Band Directors Association. However, Ms. Mitchell's truest reward and greatest joy is serving as a mentor to her students, former students, and young band directors across the state.

## A.E. McCLAIN OUTSTANDING YOUNG BAND DIRECTOR AWARD

Alfred E. "Bill" McClain, Tennessee band director and music educator for many years, collapsed and died of a heart attack while judging the 1979 Mississippi High School Band Festival in Jackson. Mr. McClain was serving as adjudicator for the marching band competition in the week-long festival at Hinds Junior College.

Mr. McClain taught and directed band in the Memphis and Shelby County school systems at Millington, Bartlett, Central, Trezevant and Overton High Schools, and was also a principal at Germantown High School. He also taught marching band courses at Vandercook School of Music in Chicago. Mr. McClain retired in 1974 as an academic advisor at Memphis State University. In 1977, he received the Tennessee Band Directors Hall of Fame Award, established by Memphis State University.

A.E. McClain was highly respected in the State of Mississippi as an adjudicator and clinician. His influence on young bandsmen and directors, his skill in developing superior bands, and his high ethical standards were truly outstanding. The Mississippi Bandmasters Association is proud to honor Mr. McClain by the presentation of the A.E. McClain Outstanding Young Band Director Award.

# ALL-STATE BAND CLINICIAN

Dr. Julia L. Baumanis

Dr. Julia L. Baumanis is a conductor and music educator that works to empower the people within and around her ensembles. She currently serves as Assistant Professor of Professional Practice on the Conducting and Music Education faculty at Rutgers University-Mason Gross School of the Arts and is the first female conductor in the university's 257-year history. Her duties include serving as the Associate Director of University Bands, the Conductor of the Rutgers Symphony Band, Associate Director of the Marching Scarlet Knights, Director of Pep Bands, and teaching courses in instrumental conducting and music education. Prior to this appointment, she served on the conducting and music education faculty at the University of Central Missouri.

An avid advocate for new works, Dr. Baumanis has premiered the works of chamber and large ensembles, working to bring new compositions forward throughout a variety of performance settings. A collaborative conductor, she frequently features guest artists as soloists on her programs, including Dr. Elena Chernova-Davis (violin) prizewinner of the Aleksander Glazunov International

Competition, Grammy nominated Conrad Herwig (trombone) of Rutgers Jazz, and Kenneth DeCarlo (trumpet) formally of the New York Philharmonic.

She also serves within the music community as a member of the Education and Repertoire Committee for the World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles (WASBE), on the Educational Advisory Committee for Music for All, as the Mentorship Committee Co-Chair for Women Band Directors International (WBDI), and as co-author of *GO ON, Tell Your Story: Voices of Women Band Directors*, a book which highlights the shared experiences of over 100 women conductors (set for publication in Fall 2023).

A graduate of The Florida State University College of Music, Dr. Baumanis received her bachelor's in Instrumental Music Education, her master's degree in Instrumental Conducting, and her PhD in Music Education and Instrumental Conducting. Prior to graduate school, she taught public school in south Florida as the Associate Director of Bands and Orchestras at J.P. Taravella High School and the Director of Orchestras at Ramblewood Middle School. She also served as chamber music coordinator and program manager of the Tallahassee Youth Orchestra and got her first "orchestral" start with the founding of the Miami based "Hip Hop Symphony," which was a collaborative performance ensemble incorporating a chamber orchestra, jazz band, a heavy metal rock band, and an improvisatory dance troop.

An active performer, educator, and researcher, Dr. Baumanis frequently is invited to guest conduct All State and Area Honor ensembles and has presented her research internationally, including at the Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic, the NAfME Research Symposium, the CBDNA National Conference, and the Desert Skies Music Education Research Symposium. Most recently, her research has focused on developing a conductor's baton that records data collected from a conductor's expressive gestures. She hopes to implement this technology in the conducting classroom as a technological tool to assist beginning conductors in developing their craft.

In January 2023, she was appointed Artistic Director and Conductor of the New Brunswick Chamber Orchestra, an over 60-year-old professional regional orchestra committed to reframing classical music through intentional programming and performance location. Her goals for NBCO are to serve a larger population within the urban New Brunswick area, including educational outreach performances for the area schools, collaborative projects with area composers, and larger concerts for the community.







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## **RED BAND CLINCIAN**

Vincent K. Rosse

**Mr. Vincent K. Rosse** is the Director of Bands at Stephenson Middle School located in Stone Mountain, Georgia. With over 25 years of experience, Mr. Rosse is one of the most sought after adjudicator/ conductors in Georgia, South Carolina, Florida, Mississippi and California. An honors graduate of Hardaway High School in Columbus, Georgia, Mr. Rosse received his B.A. in Music Education from the University of Southern Mississippi and his M.A. in Music Education from Troy State University in Troy, Alabama, and received his Educational Leadership Certification from the State University of West Georgia and has most recently completed the Education Specialist Degree from Walden University.



His professional teaching career began in Columbia, Mississippi at Jefferson Middle and Columbia High Schools(Miss.). Mr. Rosse has also taught at Stone Mountain Middle School, Mundy's Mill High School, Spencer High School in Columbus, Georgia, Albany High School in Albany, Georgia, North Clayton High School in College Park, Georgia and LaGrange High School in LaGrange, Georgia. Mr. Rosse has also served as a guest professor at Morris Brown College in Atlanta Georgia and was the Instrumental Band Lead Teacher for Clayton County Schools in Jonesboro Georgia.

Bands under his leadership have gone on to perform in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York, the Tournament of Roses Parade in Pasadena, California, The All-American Music Festival in Orlando, Florida and Performing Arts Abroad in Mexico City, Mexico.

As a performer Mr. Rosse has performed twice at the Mid-West International Band and Orchestra Clinic with Hardaway High School and the Tara Winds Community Band. He has also performed with the Columbus Symphony Orchestra as Principal Percussionist, the LaGrange Symphony Orchestra, and the Meridian Symphony. He has had the honor of being the percussion instructor at the Southeastern Music Center at Columbus State University; Guest Conductor and Percussion Instructor at the Encore Music Camp at Georgia College; and Assistant Director for the Atlanta Olympic Band.

His awards and accolades include: Who's Who in Music in 1980, Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities in 1983; Outstanding Young Man of America Award in 1985 and 1987; Outstanding Leadership Award in 1989 from Spencer High School; the Golden Apple Teacher Award in 1996; Who's Who Among American Teachers in 1999 and 2000, Teacher of The Month in 2003 from Mundy's Mill High School and Teacher of the Year from Stone Mountain Middle School in 2011 and most recently chosen as the 2021 Teacher of the Year at Stephenson Middle School Mr. Rosse is a 2004 recipient of the John Philip Sousa Legion of Honor.

In 2006 Mr. Rosse was inducted into the National High School Band Directors Hall of Fame. Mr. Rosse is a former member of the Board of Directors for the Georgia Music Educators Association where he served as Multi-Cultural Awareness Chairman, All State Organizing Chair and Chairman of the Music Selection Committee. His is also a former member of the Board of Directors for Arts Clayton Incorporated; and currently a member of the Board of Directors for Troy University - Southeastern United States Honor Band.

His professional affiliations include Phi Beta Mu Bandmasters, Kappa Kappa Psi, Kappa Alpha Psi, Phi Mu Alpha. In addition, he serves as a motivational speaker at schools and churches across the country. He is happily married to Sonja and they enjoy traveling together.



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# WHITE BAND CLINICIAN

Dr. Chandler Wilson

**Chandler L. Wilson** is the Assistant Director of Athletic Bands and Assistant Professor of Music Education at Florida State University. His responsibilities with athletic bands include being a part of the creative team behind the Marching Chiefs and FSU's athletic pep band program, Seminole Sound, which primarily supports the men's basketball program as well as the women's basketball and volleyball programs. As a part of the wind band conducting and music education faculty, Wilson teaches courses in music education and conducts the University Concert Band.

A native of Miami, FL, Wilson attended Florida A&M University (FAMU) where he earned the Bachelor of Science in Music Education. While a student at FAMU, he served as the University Band President

and section leader of the saxophones. During his time at FAMU, he was selected as the student arranger and conductor for the marching and symphonic bands and was selected as one of the first student staff members for the "Marching 100." Wilson earned the Master of Arts in Wind Band Conducting from the Indiana University of Pennsylvania, and the Ph.D. in Music Education with an emphasis in Wind Band Conducting from Florida State University.

Many of Wilson's compositions have been premiered and performed on the concert band stage with All-County/District Honor Bands and All-State Bands. His works have also been performed at the Music for All National Festival and the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Clinic. His composition, *Legends of the Galaxy (A Cosmic Fanfare)*, was ranked in the Top 100 band compositions in the American Band College/Band World Magazine/Western International Band Clinic Literature List for 2016 and one of his most recent work, *Suite Forty-Four*, was performed at the 2019 Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic by the Hikarigaoka Girls' High School Wind Orchestra.

He has works published with Bravo Music, BRS Music Inc., C.L.Barnhouse, CLW Music Warehouse, Murphy Music Press, Inc., and Randall Standridge Music Publications.

Prior to his appointment at Florida State University, Wilson served as Associate Director of Bands and Director of Athletic Bands at Eastern Michigan University, with previous public-school experience as director of bands at Hollywood Hills High School and Cooper City High School. Wilson also served as the associate conductor of the Broward Symphonic Band under Neil Jenkins and the assistant conductor of the Music Ambassadors Europe Music Tour in the summers of 2010 and 2012. Wilson has studied conducting under the batons of Richard Clary, Jack Stamp, Julian White, Shelby Chipman, Roby George, and Raffaele Ponti.

Wilson holds professional memberships in the College Band Directors National Association, National Association for Music Educators, Florida Music Educators Association, Florida Bandmasters Association, National Band Association, Kappa Kappa Psi National Honorary Band Fraternity, Pi Kappa Lambda National Music Honor Society, and is an honorary member "Friend of the Arts" of Sigma Alpha lota, Tau Beta Sigma, and Phi Mu Alpha. Wilson is a recipient of the Florida Bandmasters Association "Tom Bishop Award" and is also a member of ASCAP (American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers.) Wilson has also been recognized and honored by *Who's Who Among America's Teachers*.

He currently resides in Tallahassee, FL with his wife Ashley, and their two children Addisyn (Addi) and Chandler Jr. (CJ).

Dr. Joseph Earp, Jr.



#### ABOUT THE ENSEMBLE

Lewisburg Middle School opened its doors in 2009 with Kim (Hallmark) Pickering as its first director of bands. Upon Mrs. Pickering's appointment as director of bands at Lewisburg High School in 2013, Ben McLemore was hired to be the new director of bands at Lewisburg Middle School. With the school and the band program quickly growing, Paul Morgan was hired to be the first assistant director of bands in 2018. Mr. Morgan was assigned to the Lewisburg High School faculty in 2019, and Matthew Pickering was hired to be the assistant director of bands at Lewisburg Middle School.

Currently, the Lewisburg Middle School Band Program is comprised of approximately 250 students grades 6-8. There are two class periods of beginner band classes divided into like-instrument groups. After the first year of instruction, all first- and second-year band students audition to be placed in intermediate band or advanced band. Intermediate Band is divided into woodwinds, brass, and percussion, and meets during two class periods. Advanced Band meets during a single period. In addition to band classes, LMS also offers a color guard class for 7th and 8th grade band and non-band students.

Bands at Lewisburg Middle School have performed in the Dr. Joe Barry Mullins Concert Band Festival in Grenada, MS and the North Mississippi Young Band Festival in Olive Branch, MS and Hernando, MS earning superior ratings in concert and sightreading. In addition, students have auditioned for and earned placements in the I-55 Band Directors Association Honor Band, the Hernando DeSoto Band Directors Association Honor Band, and the Mississippi American School Band Directors Association Middle School All State Band.

#### About the Conductor



Lowell Hollinger, Conductor

A native of Miami, Florida, **Lowell Hollinger** earned two degrees from Jackson State University, Jackson, Mississippi: The Bachelor of Science degree in Biology and the Bachelor of Music Degree in Performance. He also earned the Master of Music degree in Clarinet Performance from Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Mr. Hollinger studied clarinet with Dr. Justin O'Dell Assistant Professor of Clarinet at Michigan State University; the former principal clarinetist of the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra Jim Moritsugu; Dr. Michael Magruder, Professor of Music, and Director of Bands at Winston-Salem State University; and Jerry Simas of the New World Symphony Orchestra.

Mr. Hollinger began a career as a musician in the sixth grade playing the bassoon. He then moved to the alto saxophone and continued that throughout high school and college. It was not until his senior year in High School that he began to study the clarinet–which became his first love–to challenge himself musically and has not looked back since. Mr. Hollinger has performed with the New World Symphony Orchestra and the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra. He has performed solo literature with the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra, the Jackson State University Orchestra, at Delta State University's Clarinet Symposium, and at Winston-Salem State University. Currently, Mr. Hollinger is a tenured clarinetist with the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra and performs with the Mississippi Wind Symphony.

Mr. Hollinger has also had the distinct pleasure of adjudicating and conducting bands including the WTSBOA All-West 9-10 Blue Band, the HBCU-NBODC All-Star Symphonic Band, and most notably The United States Army Band Pershing's Own.

Mr. Hollinger is an Assistant Professor of Music, Associate Director of Bands, and Director/Conductor of the premiere performing ensemble of the Jackson State University band program the Wind Ensemble which includes the world-renowned Jackson State University Marching Band "The Sonic Boom of the South." He has also conducted the University Woodwind Ensemble. In 2012, Mr. Hollinger secured a \$500,000 endowment for the Jackson State University band program which was named in honor of Dr. Lewis Liddell, Sr. As former Director of Bands at Jackson State University, Dr. Liddell was a very influential figure in Mr. Hollinger's life. The endowment provides additional scholarships for band students and serves as a budgetary supplement.

Mr. Lowell Hollinger is married to Jasmine C. Hollinger, M.D. and is a member and deacon of New Horizon Church International, Jackson, Mississippi. He is the proud father of Kynzie Emeri Hollinger and Jynesis Ciniyah Hollinger who are the joy of his life.

#### Program notes...

The Trace, op. 252 Commissioned by the Delta Chapter of Phi Beta Mu (Mississippi) Dedicated to the memory of ohn Gary Cook

The Natchez Trace is a historic forest trail that begins

near Nashville, Tennessee and winds its way for 440 miles through Alabama and Mississippi, ending at Natchez on the Mississippi River. Used for centuries by the indigenous people living in this area of the country, it later became a vital trade link in the 18th and 19th centuries. Although parts of the original footbath are still accessible, this beautiful area is now traversed by the Natchez Trace Parkway allowing visitors to enjoy a leisurely drive without commercial vehicles, and take part in hiking, biking and camping activities.

The Trace was certainly created with thoughts of this well-known feature of the state of Mississippi, so when asked to write a piece for the Mississippi chapter of the international bandmasters fraternity, Phi Beta Mu, the Natchez trace seemed an obvious choice from which to draw inspiration. The piece is dedicated to John Gary Cook, an exceptional and much-loved band director and mentor to many. When I was approached about writing this piece, I was told that Mr. Cook had often said, "That Robert Sheldon... he sure can write a beautiful melody." With that in mind I have endeavored to write a piece worthy of his memory, using as much of my melody making skills as possible while also attempting to honor him by referencing a beautiful and historic part of the state he so loved.

One of the most performed composers of concert band music, Robert Sheldon's compositions are performed around the world and appear on many international concert and contest lists. With over three million copies of his compositions, arrangements and books sold, Dr. Sheldon regularly accepts commissions for new works, and produces numerous publications for concert band and orchestra each year.

#### Do We Hear What Others Hear? Tips for Improving the Concert Band Grand Conference Room A

This clinic will explore common problems occurring in the concert band and seek to offer helpful strategies and solutions to address these issues. Topics include challenges faced by all directors in improving ensemble tone, intonation, balance and blend, technique, and musicianship. (categories addressed in the concert band evaluations)

Elva Kaye Lance is Director of Bands at Mississippi State University. Her current responsibilities include conducting the Wind Ensemble, providing leadership for the Famous Maroon Band, and administering all aspects of the band program. Ms. Lance also teaches Advanced Conducting and Secondary Methods in the Department of Music. A veteran music educator of more than forty years, she previously taught instrumental music in the public schools of Mississippi.

Now in her 32nd year at Mississippi State, Ms. Lance has guided the band program through the completion of a multimillion-dollar rehearsal facility and construction of a new synthetic turf practice field. Under her leadership, the band program has seen the expansion of the band staff and a student enrollment that now includes four concert bands, jazz band, two basketball pep bands, and a marching band with an enrollment of approximately 400 students.

As a conductor, she has led the Wind Ensemble in performances for international concert audiences during a 2008 tour of the British Isles, a 2011 tour in Austria and Germany, and an Italian tour in 2014 which included a performance at the International Music Meeting in Padova, Italy. In addition to an annual regional performance tour in the fall semester, in May of 2019 the Wind Ensemble performed in Germany, Austria, and the Czech Republic, and in early 2020 for the American Bandmasters Association Convention.

Ms. Lance maintains an active schedule as a clinician and adjudicator for both concert and marching band events throughout the country. Additionally, she has been a contributor to the Teaching Music Through Performance in Band series. In 2011, she received the "State Pride" award from the College of Education for excellence in teaching, research, and service and the Edythe M. McArthur Outstanding Woman Band Director Award for the state of Mississippi. She was named Outstanding Bandmaster for Mississippi in 2015, and in 2017 was named

Outstanding Contributor to Bands in Mississippi by the Delta Chapter of Phi Beta Mu. She was elected to membership in the prestigious American Bandmasters Association in 2018.

Ms. Lance has served as the state chair for the College Band Directors National Association and is presently the state chair for the National Band Association. She is Past President of the International Bandmasters Fraternity Phi Beta Mu. Additional professional memberships include the Mississippi Bandmasters Association, Kappa Kappa Psi, Sigma Alpha lota, and the National Association for Music Education.




This clinic, presented by Mississippi State University's double reed faculty, Dr. Jessica Haislip and Dr. Denise Rowan, is designed to give band directors the tools to help young double reed players achieve success. Clinic topics will include basic exercises for building technique, tone, and intonation; recommendations for instrument selection and care; and an opportunity to ask all your double reed questions.

Dr. Jessica Haislip serves as an Instructor of Music at Mississippi State University, where she teaches oboe and History and Appreciation of Music and coaches the double reed ensembles. In addition to her teaching duties, Dr. Haislip serves as Principal Oboe of the Monroe Symphony Orchestra (LA), Second Oboe of the North Mississippi Symphony Orchestra, and Co-Principal Oboe and English Horn of the Starkville-MSU Symphony Orchestra. She has held the position of Second Oboe and English Horn of the Missouri Symphony Orchestra in Columbia, Missouri for the annual Hot Summer Nights Music Festival, and she has performed with such ensembles as the Kansas City Symphony (MO), the Mississippi Symphony Orchestra (MS), the Tuscaloosa Symphony Orchestra (AL), the Corinth Symphony Orchestra (MS), the Fargo-Moorhead Symphony Orchestra (ND), the Mankato Symphony Orchestra (MN), and the Midwest Chamber Ensemble (MO). Dr. Haislip has appeared as a soloist with the Monroe Symphony Orchestra, the Midwest Chamber Ensemble, the Mississippi State University Wind Ensemble, and the Mississippi State University Concert Band. She frequently performs throughout the region at festivals and conferences including the Music By Women Festival (MS), the Mississippi Music Teachers Association Conference (MS), and New Music on the Bayou (LA). Recent conference appearances include the 2022 International Double Reed Society conference in Boulder, Colorado and the 2022 Florida Flute Association conference in Orlando, Florida. Dr. Haislip holds the Doctor of Musical Arts degree and the Master of Music degree in Oboe Performance from the University of Missouri-Kansas City, and the Bachelor of Music degree in Oboe Performance from Concordia College (MN). Her primary teachers include Barbara Bishop and Jennifer Peterson

**Dr. Denise Rowen** received her Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, Massachusetts, and her Master of Music and Doctorate of Musical Arts degrees from the University of Southern Mississippi, in Hattiesburg, Mississippi. Her career in music education spans forty plus years of directing bands and orchestras from Maine through Massachusetts and, for seven of those years, Dr. Rowan served as the Music Director/Conductor of the Starkville/ Mississippi State University Symphony Orchestra. Dr. Rowan has been the double reed instructor at Mt. Holyoke College, in South Hadley, Massachusetts, Mississippi College, in Clinton, Mississippi, and is currently the bassoon instructor at Mississippi State University. As a performer she has played in orchestras throughout the Eastern United States, Pensacola, Florida, and for eleven years she performed as a member of the Mississippi Symphony, the Mississippi Ballet Orchestra, the Mississippi Opera Orchestra, the St. Andrews Chamber Orchestra, and as a guest with the Tupelo, and the Meridian Symphony Orchestras. Currently, Dr. Rowan serves a principal bassoonist with the Starkville, Mississippi State University Symphony Orchestra, and the Corinth Symphony Orchestra in Corinth, Mississippi. She performs regularly with the Millennia Musicae Chamber Ensemble of which she is a founding member, as well as with the faculty quartet at Mississippi State University. A recording of the Millenia Musicae Chamber Ensemble has been published on the Centaur label.

Her professional associations include the following: past president of the Mississippi Bandmasters association, with a lifetime membership in this association, serving as past president of the Mississippi Chapter of the Women Band Directors Association, induction into the Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, and the Mississippi chapter of the Phi Beta Mu Band Fraternity. In 2002 Dr. Rowan was awarded the National Federation of Interscholastic Music Association's Outstanding Music Educator Award, and in 2010 she was inducted into the Starkville Area Education Hall of Fame as an outstanding educator. She is a current member of the International Double Reed Society, the College Music Society, and the National Association of College Wind and Percussion Instructors. Dr. Rowan and her husband of forty-seven years live in Starkville on their horse farm. She has two grown children, one foster daughter, and four grandchildren.

#### Clarinet Capable: Effective Teaching Strategies and Essential Skills for the Clarinet Section Grand Conference Room A



#### Paula Corley

What skills do your clarinet students need to be successful? Do you 'start over' at every rehearsal and spend most of the time chasing errors? Learning to play an instrument and learning to play in an ensemble are sometimes confused. The teaching/learning strategies for ensembles are not always the best strategies for individual skill development. This presentation will identify teaching strategies and essential skills that will improve your clarinet section.

**Paula Corley** was born and raised in Winona, Mississippi. She was a member of the Mississippi Lions All State Band and a student participant in the Mississippi Bandmasters State Clinic all four years of high school. She earned a BME from Mississippi State University, and an MM from Southern Methodist University. In 2013, she was recognized as alumnus of the year in the music department at Mississippi State University.

Paula taught instrumental music for thirty-five years in the schools of Mississippi, North Carolina, and Texas, from middle school to university levels. She has presented more than fifty clinics nationwide and served as Pedagogy Chair for the International Clarinet Association. She authored So You Want to Play the Clarinet, The Break, and four clarinet solo and clarinet choir arrangements adopted by the Texas UIL prescribed music list. Her articles have appeared in The Instrumentalist, The Clarinet, The Texas Bandmasters Review and in Vandoren WAVE. In February 2024, Paula will make her 7th appearance at the Texas Music Educators Association Clinic and Convention as an invited clinician for the Orchestra Division.

Currently Paula is the Education Advisor for Buffet Crampon North America and serves as a clinician for Music for All. She is an artist for Buffet Crampon and Vandoren. Her website www.clarinetcity.com and YouTube channel (Clarinet City – Paula Corley) are devoted to clarinet teaching and playing with articles, practice materials, and instructional videos – all free. **Connie Sprinkell** is a well-known, retired band director in Mississippi. He received his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in Music Education from USM and taught bands in Mississippi for over four decades. Thriving: Unlocking the Value of Music Education for K-12 and Education Success Grand Conference Room A

The focus of this session is to help directors shift from "surviving" to "thriving" by increasing advocacy, building collaboration with the administrative team, and creating a "win-win" situation for all stakeholders. Post pandemic recovery will require every music educator to utilize the essential skills of building awareness, collaboration, and support. This panel presentation will give participants strategies and tools to develop the next chapter of success for their program.

**Dr. Ben Burnett**, a 1982 graduate of Oak Grove High School, Ben Burnett began his career in education in 1986 as assistant high school band director for the Meridian High School band. In 1988 he returned to his alma mater as director of the Oak Grove High School band. As band director at Oak Grove, his band consistently rated superior at contests and State Band Festival and also increased in size from 50 to over 220. During his career, Dr. Burnett served as President of the Mississippi Bandmasters, President of SEMBDA and state chair of the National Band Association. He served on the staff of the Mississippi Lions All-State Band in 1990 and 1996 and was the recipient of the A.E. McClain outstanding young band director award. In 2013, he was inducted to the Southeast Mississippi Band Director's Association Hall of fame.

In 1997, Dr. Burnett moved into school administration as Principal of Oak Grove Middle School. In August of 2007, he was elected Superintendent of the Lamar County School District and was reelected in 2011. During his tenure as Superintendent, the Lamar County Schools moved to being rated an A school district under the Mississippi Department of Education's accountability system.

Dr. Burnett retired from public education on June 1, 2014, and accepted the position of Dean of the School of Education at William Carey University. The William Carey School of Education has an enrollment of 1,600 education undergraduate and graduate education majors. In April of 2020, he was named the Executive Vice-President of the university and then was named the 10th President of the university in August of 2022.

Dr. Burnett holds a Bachelors and Master's degrees in Music Education from USM and a Ph.D. in Educational Administration from USM. He has been married to Denice Burnett, a retired special education director, for 34 years and they have one son, Lane, who is a graduate of William Carey University.

**Travis Coakley** is the Director of Bands at William Carey University where he conducts the William Carey University Symphonic Winds, directs the "Spirit of Carey" Marching Band, and oversees all instrumental activities and the department of music education in the Winters School of Music at William Carey University. Mr. Coakley teaches undergraduate and graduate instrumental conducting and serves as the campus sponsor of the William Carey NAFME Collegiate Chapter.

Before coming to William Carey University, Mr. Coakley spent twenty-three years as a high school band director in Mississippi, Florida, and South Carolina where his bands consistently received the highest ratings for concert, marching, and jazz bands. Mr. Coakley is an active member of the National Association for Music Education, National Band Association, Phi Beta Mu Honorary Band Fraternity, and the American School Band Directors Association where he is currently serving as National Past-President.

Zachary J. Harris taught instrumental music for 37 years in schools across Mississippi. He is currently part-time music instructor at William Carey University, where he teaches music education courses, and supervises instrumental student interns. Prior to his retirement, Mr. Harris was Director of Bands for the Gulfport School District, where he oversaw all instrumental wind programs for the district. He conducted the Symphonic Band, taught music for the marching band, and served as Department Chairperson. Mr. Harris, a native of Jackson, Mississippi, received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from Mississippi Valley State University and his Masters of Music Education from the University of Mississippi. He started his teaching career at Newton High School, where on April 30th, 1991, The Mayor of Newton, Terry C. Burton, proclaimed that day to be "Pride of Newton" High School Band Day. He is a member of Mississippi Bandmasters Association Inc., where he was past president, Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, National Federation High School Music Association, and Phi Beta Mu where he served on the Executive Board. Mr. Harris has served on regional and state level music committees in Mississippi. He was the Southeastern Representative for the National Federation of State High School Association's Music Committee from 1997-2001. Mr. Harris has been a guest clinician throughout the southeastern states. Mr. Harris was also named "Administrator of the Year" for the Brookhaven School District in 2002-2003. In 2005, he was selected as Star Teacher for Brookhaven High School. In 2011, Mr. Harris was named Band Director of the Year for District and State. Mr. Harris' bands have received Superior Ratings consistently through the years in marching, sight-reading, and concert.

In 2008, Mr. Harris Symphonic Band was selected to perform at the Mississippi Band Director's Association State Clinic. The Gulfport Band is the only band to have performed for this special occasion twice. His band was also selected as the featured band for the "Year in Review" with the Mississippi High School Activities Association. In March 2016, his Gulfport Symphonic Band performed at the Music for All National Concert Festival in Indianapolis, Indiana, where his band was the first band from Mississippi to be accepted to the National Festival. While performing his final concert with his symphonic band, the Mayor of Gulfport presented Mr. Harris with a proclamation naming May 1, 2017, as Zachary J. Harris day, for his outstanding service and dedication to the Gulfport School District Band Program. In December 2018, Zachary J. Harris was inducted in the Phi Beta Mu's Delta Chapter of Mississippi's Hall of Fame and in 2021 was inducted into the Magnolia Band Directors Association Hall of Fame. Zachary is married to Sheila, and they have two beautiful daughters Brianna and Zacharia.

**Cameron Whitworth Jenkins** is the CEO of Full Potential Leadership, an international communications platform that coaches innovative leaders in maximizing their strengths, equipping their teams, and reaching their full potential. Before entering the field of music education, Cameron completed his undergraduate degree with a 4.0 GPA, within four years, and debt free from Alcorn State University. He holds a Master's degree in Music Education, and he is currently completing his doctorate at William Carey University. Cameron is a proud 2008 Coca-Cola Scholar and a Life-Member of Alpha Phi Alpha, Fraternity, Inc.

Cameron is an interactive speaker, leadership consultant/clinician, professional development coach, and community leader. From small rural programs to The Midwest Clinic, Cameron has inspired leaders from around the globe. In 2021, Cameron gained Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion certification from the University of Pennsylvania.

Cameron and his wife, Lu Jenkins, have two toddlers, Cali Rae and Cason.

**Eddie Peasant**, Assistant Dean and Assistant Professor in the School of Education, began his tenure at William Carey University in July 2022. He is a 30-year veteran educator with twenty years of administrative experience and most recently, retired as superintendent of the Starkville Oktibbeha School District. A former Mississippi Administrator of the Year, Peasant's experience as an educator also includes serving as assistant superintendent in the Tupelo School District and as principal of Clinton High School and Gulfport Middle School. He began his career as a music educator and taught band for nine years in the Jackson Public Schools and Escambia County Schools (Florida).

He has left a positive footprint in each place he has been blessed to serve. Nonverbal Communication/Score Study for the Practicing Band Director (Part I of II) Vicksburg/Concordia

#### Dr. Julia Baumanis

Want to do more score study for your ensemble but never seem to find the time? Want to effectively communicate what you want in the music to your ensemble but not sure how to impactfully do this in your conducting gesture? Join us to learn about practical strategies for score study and nonverbal communication skills for the practicing band director. Topics include time-saving score study techniques, rehearsal scaffolding, effective conducting gesture, and implementation skills to put your score study into your teaching.

In our incredibly busy days, practicing band directors often don't feel they have time to study their scores, practice their conducting gesture, and prepare adequately for rehearsals. While we can't control the workday load, we can offer quick but effective score study techniques and purposeful nonverbal communication via conducting gesture designed to prepare directors for their rehearsals, even in a very compact amount of time.

Techniques that the clinicians will present include the following: 1) quick and effective ways to quickly dissect and interpret scores, 2) resources for rehearsal prep, including strategies in scaffolding your rehearsals to teach a piece of music in an effective sequential way for students, 3) and "teaching through transfer" in order to help grab similar contexts in different scores and how they relate to one another for effective rehearsal strategies in less time. From here, session attendees will also receive quick but impactful lessons in conducting gesture, using the practice of Laban Dance principles to communicate the musical message they want to convey from their score study. This session is designed ANYONE who is a leader of an ensemble, student and/or professionals!

Dr. Julia L. Baumanis is a conductor and music educator that works to empower the people within and around her ensembles. She currently serves as Assistant Professor of Professional Practice on the Conducting and Music Education faculty at Rutgers University-Mason Gross School of the Arts and is the first female conductor in the university's 257year history. Her duties include serving as the Associate Director of University Bands, the Conductor of the Rutgers Symphony Band, Associate Director of the Marching Scarlet Knights, Director of Pep Bands, and teaching courses in instrumental conducting and music education. Prior to this appointment, she served on the conducting and music education faculty at the University of Central Missouri.

Stepping onto the podium to conduct a concert is perhaps the most visible hat we wear as a band director but setting that stage for a successful performance starts months and even years prior. The behind-the-scenes work it takes to even get students into a classroom, much less onto a stage, requires mountains of paperwork and planning to get to those wonderfully musical moments. This clinic will explore ways to keep your program organized and the steps it takes to plan out the calendar year with topics ranging from recruitment, event planning, bookkeeping, and more, all with hopes to share valuable resources you can put to use in your own programs to streamline the behind-the-scenes work so you can focus more on everyone's favorite parts of the job - educating young students and making music together!

Elizabeth Jackson is in her thirteenth year of teaching and is the Director of Bands for Ocean Springs Middle School and Upper Elementary. She leads the All-Superior OSMS Symphonic Band, the OSMS Varsity Band, woodwind classes for all 7-8th grade bands, and the 6th grade beginner clarinet class. She also maintains an active clarinet studio whose members regularly rank in the Mississippi Lions All-State Band. She started her career in 2011 as the Assistant Band Director for Ocean Springs Middle School, and the program has continued to thrive under her leadership with nearly 400 students enrolled in grades 6-8th annually and all-superior ratings for the middle school concert ensembles.

Ms. Jackson graduated from Northwest Rankin High School in 2004 and summa cum laude from the University of Southern Mississippi in 2009. She went on to receive her Master of Music Education in 2011 while working as a graduate assistant for the USM Bands. This session will address the thought process that led to the development of a competitive WGI indoor winds ensemble. The session will explore the educational and philosophical rationales that informed the decision and will also explore practical considerations related to the implementation of these types of ensembles.

**Dr. Jeremy Morgan** spent 20 years in full-time instrumental music education. For 10 years, he served as a band director in Alabama and Mississippi before moving to collegiate teaching for another 10 years.

Dr. Morgan achieved the rank of full professor at William Carey University where he served as Chair of Instrumental Activities and Music Education. In addition to his administrative and classroom responsibilities, Dr. Morgan directed various ensembles and founded Carey's indoor winds ensemble — Evidence Winds. Since its founding in 2018, Evidence Winds has produced 4 shows. Those shows have resulted in a Silver Medal, a Bronze Medal, and 4 Finalist Awards in World Championship competition.

This session will provide practical rehearsal skills with a live lab ensemble!! Playing educational music grade 1-3, the ensemble will sight read, offering a real-time rehearsal scenario. This session focuses on podium REHEARSAL skills, including listening techniques and effective teaching frame/rehearsal scaffolding techniques for quick (but effective) rehearsals!

This session is designed as "Part Two" of a session series. "Part One" focuses on time saving score study/conducting gesture techniques for the practicing band director. This session ("Part Two") focuses on implementing that effective score study into the rehearsal process.

Within this session, participants will have the opportunity to rehearse a lab ensemble on educational level music (grades 1-3). The ensemble will sight read these pieces, creating a more real-life setting for participants as opposed to a "polished and already practiced on the repertoire" ensemble.

This session is designed to focus on the rehearsal process and is NOT intended to model a conducting session/symposium. Instead, the clinicians will lead participants on guided listening strategies from the podium, how to diagnose musical areas of need, and then how to prescribe ways in which to improve these areas of musical need. Specifically, the clinicians will focus on teaching/rehearsal frames, which are impactful was to assess and improve the music within a compact amount of time. Both sessions ("part one" and "part two") focus on effective, impactful, but also time- saving techniques, which will help participants capitalize their (sometimes limited) time with their students in rehearsal in their own band rooms.

The second year is the most important year of band. So much curriculum and "thinking" processes are developed in the Intermediate Band year. Besides curriculum, there are many developmental milestones that occur in middle school. This session covers what curriculum should be taught and how to deal with students who are experiencing growth milestones during the gap year between beginner band and performing band.

Jennifer Sills is in her 26<sup>th</sup> year of teaching band in Mississippi. She is currently in her 10<sup>th</sup> year with the Madison County School District where she serves as Assistant Band Director at Madison Central High School. She conducts the Concert Band, teaches beginner saxophone and double reed classes and helps with all aspects of the band program. Mrs. Sills received her Bachelor of Music Education from Delta State University and her Masters and Specialists of Instructional Leadership from William Carey University. She is also a Nation Board-Certified teacher. Mrs. Sills is a member of the Mississippi Band Directors' Association, American School Band Directors' Association, East Central Mississippi Band Directors' Association and Phi Beta Mu. #### How to Prepare a Traditional Style Band for Marching Competition: Using the Evaluation Process 4:00 PM – 4:50 PM Vicksburg/Concordia Room

Traditional-style bands, sometimes known as show bands, are marching bands geared primarily towards crowd entertainment. Competitive show bands perform only one show that is continually refined throughout a season, while bands that focus on entertainment rather than competition usually perform a unique show for each game. Most shows will consist of several selections accompanied by formations rooted in traditional drill patterns easily found in collegiate bands.

The question is: how do these marching ensembles find success during the evaluation process? During this session, we will discuss ways to be confident in the product that is presented, as well as how to effectively understand and evaluate groups of this style.

**Chandler L. Wilson** is the Assistant Director of Athletic Bands and Assistant Professor of Music Education at Florida State University. His responsibilities with athletic bands include being a part of the creative team behind the Marching Chiefs and FSU's athletic pep band program, Seminole Sound, which primarily supports the men's basketball program as well as the women's basketball and volleyball programs. As a part of the wind band conducting and music education faculty, Wilson teaches courses in music education and conducts the University Concert Band.

A native of Miami, FL, Wilson attended Florida A&M University (FAMU) where he earned the Bachelor of Science in Music Education. While a student at FAMU, he served as the University Band President and section leader of the saxophones. During his time at FAMU, he was selected as the student arranger and conductor for the marching and symphonic bands and was selected as one of the first student staff members for the "Marching 100." Wilson earned the Master of Arts in Wind Band Conducting from the Indiana University of Pennsylvania, and the Ph.D. in Music Education with an emphasis in Wind Band Conducting from Florida State University.

#### I Have the Parts Covered, but My Band Still Doesn't Sound Good!

Repertoire considerations for programs with small ensembles

Selecting appropriate repertoire for smaller bands and orchestras will always be a challenge for ensemble directors. How do you challenge students who are advanced musicians while fostering growth for those who are developing? How do you ensure the ensemble sounds full when you can barely cover the parts? How do you build quality without appropriate quantity?

Joseph Benjamin Earp is the Music/Music Industry Chair and Director of Bands at Hinds Community College in Raymond, Mississippi. He received his undergraduate degree in Music Education from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, Master of Music in Music Education from Anderson University (Anderson, South Carolina), and Doctor of Music Education degree from Liberty University (Lynchburg, Virginia). In 2019, Dr. Earp was inducted into the Omega Nu Lambda National College Honor Society based on his academic achievement at Liberty University. In 2020, he was named a Distinguished Alumni Award recipient by the College of Arts and Architecture at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte.

In addition to teaching, Dr. Earp is an active published composer and arranger with his music being performed internationally. 

### Teaching in Underserved Populations with Adequate Potential: How to Reach Them Where They are and Take Them Further!

Research persists that students in low income/at-risk areas are inadequately equipped with the resources needed to maximize their potential. This session will provide insight into best practices, guides, and tips for teaching in underserved populations to maximize student potential.

Dr. Roderick Little currently serves as Director of Bands/Assistant Professor of Music at Jackson State University. He received his Bachelors and Masters in Music Education, and a Doctorate in Urban Higher Education Administration, all from Jackson State University. A native of Jackson, MS, he grew up in a musical family/background. During his matriculation at JSU he participated in several ensembles including the famous "Sonic Boom of the South" where he played in the percussion section as a snare drummer, marched as part of the Jackson Five Drum Major squad, and served as a student arranger for the Sonic Boom and student conductor of the Symphonic Band. Dr. Little studied percussion under Dr. Owen Rockwell, whom is his predecessor at JSU. After completing his undergraduate studies, he returned to his high school alma mater, Lanier High School. During his tenure at Lanier, his bands received excellent and superior ratings at marching/concert festivals. He also had students that made the Mississippi All State Lions Band (top student honor band in MS).

In 2012, Dr. Little began as Assistant Band Director and Instructor of Music at Jackson State University. He was promoted to Associate Director of Bands in 2013 and later, Marching Band Director in 2015. While Director of the Marching Band, he has maintained the rich traditions of the Sonic Boom while adding a unique twist with the use of technology and other innovative ideas. As director, Dr. Little started several outreach programs which include, but are not limited to, the Summer High School Band Camp and A Day with the Boom; both which act as major recruitment agents for the Department of Music/band program grossing over 400-600 students collectively annually. He started the public media relations of the Sonic Boom with the implementation of the Sonic Boom Media Team and strengthened social media platforms. Most importantly, he improved the inner workings of the overall operations of the entire JSU Band(s) program.

As the drill writer for the Sonic Boom of the South having had several monumental field shows adding to the bands lustrous history of band pageantry, In the spring of 2020, the Sonic Boom of the South's "Saints Halftime Show- Salute to the Veterans" was selected to be featured at the CBDNA-NBC Southern Division Conference which was the first appearance in the school's history. He also arranged a massive catalog of music for the Sonic Boom of the South. His other duties at Jackson State include co-conductor of the wind ensemble, conductor of the symphonic band, director of

percussion ensemble and teaching in the percussion studio. He has acquired several new percussion instruments through NASM upgrades (an initiative started by Dr. Owen Rockwell and Dr. Darcie Bishop), which include steel pans for the percussion studio. Dr. Little also assists with observing student teachers during their clinical teaching experience(s) and has motivated several students to become successful teachers and performers. His research interest is centered on strengthening music education in urban at-risk areas.

Dr. Little is an accomplished conductor, clinician, adjudicator, composer, arranger, drill writer, and instrumentalist. He has served as a guest clinician in numerous states across the country including Mississippi, Tennessee, Georgia, Louisiana, and California. He has arranged for numerous middle and high schools, colleges, chamber groups, jazz ensembles and church conventions. He has also scored piano music for F & S Music KC Publishing Company, which was founded by Lannie Spann McBride, a former instructor of music at JSU and revered church musician and keen motivator. He performed with local groups around Jackson, MS and momentarily in Houston, TX. He has professional affiliations with The National Association for Music Education (NAfME), Percussive Art Society (PAS), Mississippi Association of Education (MAE), Mississippi Band Masters Association (MBA), HBCU National Band Directors Consortium (HBCU-NBDC) and College Band Directors National Association (CBDNA).

He is married to Lynise Little whom he met at JSU in the "Sonic Boom." They were the first to do a joint recital at Jackson State showcasing the music of both classical and contemporary jazz genres. They have two sons, Aiden and Alec Little.

### Brass Instruments 101: Common Problems and Solutions 1:30 PM- 2:20 PM Grand Conference Room A

Teaching brass instruments to young students can be challenging for all young directors, especially for those whose primary instrument area is woodwinds or percussion. This session will take participants on a quick survey of some of the most common problems young brass players have and provide helpful solutions for more effective teaching. Concepts covered will include embouchure, posture, tone production, and other basic brass playing fundamentals.

**Dr. Craig Aarhus** is Associate Director of Bands and Associate Professor of Music at Mississippi State University. At MSU, he co-directs the Famous Maroon Band and basketball pep bands, conducts Wind Ensemble "B;" the Concert Band, and Campus Band, and teaches Conducting and Brass Techniques in the Department of Music. He also currently serves as the area coordinator for Music Education in the department. As a member of the band faculty, Dr. Aarhus has been part of a team that has helped lead the band program to unprecedented growth, making it currently one of the largest bands in the Southeast.

A native of Alabama, Dr. Aarhus received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from Auburn University and his Master of Arts and Doctor of Musical Arts degrees in Conducting from The University of Iowa. While at Iowa, he was the recipient of the prestigious Iowa Performance Fellowship and was a conducting student of Dr. Myron Welch. He also served as a graduate conductor for all the concert bands, arranged music and wrote drill for the Hawkeye Marching Band, and was co-director of the Iowa Pep Band. During this time, he was also the director of the Southeast Iowa Concert Band at Iowa Wesleyan College for one year. Prior to his appointment at MSU, Dr. Aarhus was a successful high school and middle band director in the public schools of Lanett, Tallassee, and Mobile, Alabama.

Dr. Aarhus is a member of several professional organizations including Phi Beta Mu (Past-President, Delta Chapter), the College Band Directors National Association, Phi

Mu Alpha, Tau Beta Sigma and the Mississippi Bandmasters Association. He is currently serving on the Board of Directors of the National Band Association and recently completed a ten-year tenure as a Governor for the Southeast District of Kappa Kappa Psi. Dr. Aarhus has been an adjudicator and clinician throughout the Southeast, Midwest, and in Canada, and is a contributing author to five volumes of the popular Teaching Music Through Performance in Band series. He has presented at numerous state and national conferences, including The Midwest Clinic, the CBDNA Summer Athletic Band Symposium, and the Mississippi Bandmasters Association State Band Clinic.

The Delta Chapter of Phi Beta Mu selected Dr. Aarhus as the 2022 "Outstanding Bandmaster" in Mississippi, and in 2019, the Southeast District of Kappa Kappa Psi named their "Outstanding Director/Sponsor;" Award after him. Other recent honors and awards include the A. Frank Martin Award from Kappa Kappa Psi for excellence in fraternity service (2017), the Clyde Muse Service Award from the MSU College of Education (2015) and selection to the George Duke Humphrey Faculty Leadership Program (2015). In 2010 and 2011, he was a recipient of the "State Pride" Award for excellence in teaching, research, and service. He has been a clinician/instructor at the Smith- Walbridge Drum Major Clinics for over 20 years, and in that capacity has had the opportunity to teach hundreds of high school and college drum majors from across the country. Dr. Aarhus and his family reside in Starkville and are members of First Presbyterian Church, where he has served as Music Director since 2007.

Teaching Beginner Band with S.A.F.E.T.Y. is not your typical beginner band clinic session. Beginner band is arguably the most important class a student can take that will determine the rest of their career in band. As music educators, we need to express caution and approach this crucial class with some S.A.F.E.T.Y. techniques. We will share ideas and teaching strategies that have worked in urban, suburban, and rural schools. This will include how to incorporate daily fundamental exercises into the beginner band as well as classroom management skills.

Conor N. Bell is a native of Carthage and the current Director of Bands at St. Joseph Catholic School in Madison. At St. Joe, Bell teaches band at all levels, directs the pit orchestra, and instructs the school's piano lab. Previously, he served as the Director of bands at Ethel High School and the Assistant Director of Bands at Leake Central High School. Bell graduated with his B.M.E. from Delta State University in 2017 and graduated with his M.M.E. from William Carey University in 2021. He also serves as the keyboardist for Parkview Church of God in Yazoo City.

**Phillip E. Pope** is in his second stint at Newton County High School where he directs the middle school bands. Pope's long tenure as a band director and elementary music teacher has brought him to schools such as Clarkdale, Magee, Sebastopol, Winona, and Philadelphia. He holds his B.M.E. from Mississippi State University and an M.Ed. in curriculum and instruction from American Intercontinental University. Pope is founder of Maestro! Leadership Camp, leadership camp for band students in high school and college. He is a native of Philadelphia.

### Moving Forward from High School Band: Getting Students Ready for College and Beyond

After your students graduate from high school, you want them to continue to participate in music in college and afterward. In this session, Dr. Rowlett will discuss how to prepare clarinetists who might want to pursue a music major, including specific information about repertoire and skills. The session will also address more general strategies for encouraging your students to become lifelong participants in music, with the goal of enriching their communities through participation in the arts.

Michael Rowlett is Associate Professor of Clarinet and Music Literature at The University of Mississippi, where he has taught since 2002. His recent appearances have included invited recitals in Vancouver, British Columbia; Nashville, Tennessee; at the inaugural American Single Reed Summit at Truman State University; and a performance of William Bolcom's Clarinet Concerto at The University of North Carolina. He has appeared regularly with the Memphis Symphony Orchestra and the Louisiana Philarmonic Orchestra. His CD Close to Home, released on the Albany record label, features the music of a diverse group contemporary American composers.

He holds a D.M. in clarinet performance from The Florida State University and degrees from The University of Iowa and The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. His teachers include Frank Kowalsky, Maurita Murphy Mead, Freddy Arteel and Donald Oehler.




